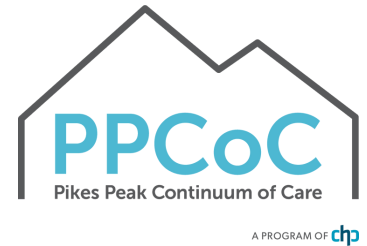


PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS 2020-2021 DATA



POINT-IN-TIME COUNT

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that all Continuums of Care (CoC) conduct an annual count of people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. The Pikes Peak CoC (PPCoC) 2021 Point-In-Time (PIT) Count took place the night of Monday, January 24, 2021. Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing Programs collected client-level demographic information from individuals and families staying that night in each program. Unsheltered individuals were not surveyed in 2021 based on guidance from HUD and shared in the [PPCoC 2021 PIT Announcement](#).

DATA DASHBOARD

In 2020, the PPCoC began to analyze and display homeless veteran households and homeless transition age youth data out of the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) for a national initiative called [Built for Zero](#). This dashboard displays the number of homeless veterans and youth who have received homeless services month to month and measures their inflow and outflow in El Paso County. The PPCoC goal is to eventually count all people experiencing homelessness residing in El Paso County including those who are unsheltered, joining more than 80 cities and counties that have committed to measurably ending homelessness, one population at a time.

PIT data only provides a snapshot of homelessness in our community. Additional data is collected year-round by the PPCoC that provides a more robust representation of the number of people experiencing homelessness in the Pikes Peak region. This data helps communities better understand why people lose their housing and, in turn, how communities can design responsive programs that ensure homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring.


