POINT IN TIME SURVEY

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that all CoCs conduct the Point in Time (PIT) survey, an annual count of people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. Emergency shelters and transitional housing programs collected client-level demographic information from individuals and families staying that night.

The PIT is required to be conducted during the last ten-days of January, however, due to a surge of COVID-19 cases in El Paso County in January 2022 and with guidance and approval from HUD, the Pikes Peak Continuum of Care, a program of Community Health Partnership, elected to conduct the PIT count on the night of February 21, 2022.
